Our winter seminar at the end of February has a theme of actions you might consider for the benefit of wildlife and the woods. These are not mutually exclusive! NYFOA had a statewide theme last spring called Restore NY Woodlands. We sponsored some statewide forest seminars nearly synchronously in late spring. The theme of "restoration" was important, because a number of forces are at work that allow decline of the forest as a natural resource. So, NYFOA has decided to continue this theme. Our winter seminar is focused on one form of restoration. But there are more! Today, we hear of using forest cull products for an energy resource...important as a possible alternative to today's increasingly impacting fossil fuel industry. If we think of our forest management plans with multiple dimensions (cull wood products, wildlife habitat, improved timber, etc.), we can perhaps at least counter the decline of our woods!

This year we will again have the expanded booth area adjacent to the seminar room in the Arts and Home Center that we enjoyed last February. Seminar topics this year will include: improved wildlife and bird habitat, timber sales, pest control, preventing timber theft, successful tree planting, profit from portable saw mills, feral hogs, help from consulting foresters, and protecting the family legacy.

NY 4-H Forestry Weekend

Cornell Cooperative Extension (CCE) will conduct their 8th annual 4-H Forestry Weekend at Delaware

County's 4-H Camp Shankitunk, Delhi, NY on May 9-11, 2014.

This year's NY Forestry weekend activities for youth aged 10 and up will include activities in education and competition in tree identification, tree measurements, compass use, and topographic map reading.

Youth will also hear about forests and forestry as a career from professional forester, Justin Perry, with NYS DEC. In addition, we will have a little fun with geocaching, a night hike, and a pest hike.

No experience is necessary to attend. The emphasis is placed on learning and having a good time, not on

competition! All have the opportunity to learn skills they can use in many future careers, meet youth from across the state, and become better stewards of our forests. In 2013, there were 55 youth (ranging in age from 10 to 17) and 27 adults attending, representing 11 NY counties.

Last year's winning team was from Orange County and represented NY State in the National 4-H Forestry Invitational Competition last July, held at the West Virginia State 4-H Camp at Jackson's Mill in Weston. coordinate the annual event. Youth and adults are charged \$40 to attend. The program relies heavily on the assistance of the MANY wonderful CCE County Educators, 4-H volunteers, and parents who promote the program in their counties, bring the youth and help out as chaperones, cooks, and score keepers, and assist with a myriad of other program activities.
