Program Overview

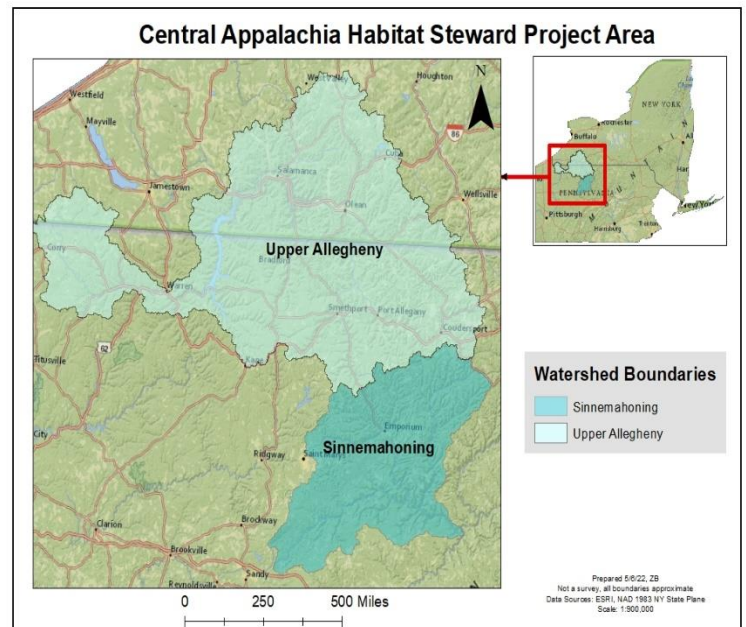
The Central Appalachia Habitat Steward Program is a collaborative effort among partners to promote management of public and private forests in the Upper Allegheny and Sinnemahoning Watersheds spanning New York and Pennsylvania.

As population trends for many forest birds decline due to loss of habitat, among other factors, the future of these forests and the benefits they provide lie in how they are managed.

By engaging diverse partners with outreach and educational programming, technical assistance, and management guidance, this project looks to increase forest diversity and improve habitat for American Woodcock, Ruffed Grouse, Wood Thrush, and Prairie Warbler, Cerulean Warbler and Golden-winged Warbler.

We offer **free, no obligation** services, such as informational materials and site visits from staff members. Staff members will walk your property with you and discuss goals you might have including, but not limited to, enhancing the variety of wildlife, identifying and controlling invasives and planning future forest composition.
